

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MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Determination - a quality all people have, but when and how they use it can vary. Determination is a key ingredient to meeting goals, to navigating obstacles, and to maintaining focus. In March, our theme is determination - which fits March perfectly. March is often a time of year in schools where focus and grit is often most challenged. We know students that can successfully make it through March keeping their goals alive can leverage Spring Break to be best prepared for the sprint to May!

One of our main goals as a school is academic success. As indicated in our school improvement plan, we have made major strides over the past eight years to increase student achievement by way of multiple measurements (GPA, Graduation Rate, Advanced Placement testing, etc.). One of our newest initiatives is implementing "on-time" interventions for students who are "temporarily" failing. Students have responded well, by and large, realizing this intervention is there to help and not punish, and using the resources in the building to get back on track. I am very proud of our students and staff for taking on this challenge - which will have a significant impact on student achievement.

March, especially for Juniors, is time to prepare for the SAT/PSAT. In our second year as a state assessment, we are learning more each day about this exam and realize the need to help prepare our students for success. The SAT is rapidly becoming the college entrance exam in Illinois, particularly at Moraine Valley Community College, for placement, and those universities are communicating their "cut" scores for entry. At Andrew, our English, math, social studies, and science departments are leveraging Khan Academy to help connect their curriculum to the SAT. Khan Academy is a powerful tool for students - allowing for individualized development within the core academic curriculum, while being exposed to SAT style questions and skills. Our goal is not to replace curriculum with test prep, but bridge the connection between the two. Research shows 20 hours of preparation using a tool like Khan can have a significant impact on test scores. Therefore, staff within these departments have elected to implement those 20 hours (5 in each subject) either within the classroom or as homework to help students. Additionally, we will open Khan Labs and lunchtime elective sessions for students to work in their Khan accounts.

March moves fast and we have many events to celebrate. Our famous Variety Show is making its debut in March and we are looking forward to it. Given the diversity within the group (athletes, band/choir students, theater students, and others), March is a great month to focus on this show outside of many other events, such as IHSA Winter tournaments, ILMEA State Competition, and Theaterfest, which often overwhelmed our students in January. I, as many, are looking forward to it.

Additional events include the Golden Bolts Distinguished Service Awards where we recognize students, staff, community members, and support staff who go above and beyond to make VJA great. Our senior leaders run the program and take immense pride in this opportunity to reward those that provide leadership and a sense of community.

Enjoy your March, and have a wonderful Spring Break!

March Advisory Theme: Determination

As a community who cares about teenagers, we all work to build resiliency and determination with our children. We have goals and share visions for their future; but when setbacks arise, it can be challenging to teach the stick-to-it-ness they will need to be successful adults. As educators, we often hear parents' frustration in supporting their kids as they matriculate through high school because they feel it is so different from their own high school experience. Parents want to know how to encourage and how to foster determination. A recent issue of *Educational Leadership* had an article that addressed this topic for teachers, but the article can be easily modified to relate to what parents are experiencing as well. There are three main messages we can all share with the students of Andrew High School. These messages carry over no matter the generation or life path.

This is important.

As a school community, we all need to convey the value of education, and the value of the topic. While we know, there are times when some people struggle to see the value of a specific topic. We understand that perspective, but sometimes it is not the skill or concept itself, but the underlying thought process that will help the student as they grow. Teachers and parents should work together to communicate the importance of all aspects of the high school curriculum.



You can do it.

In recent years, District 230 has been reading the research behind the idea of Growth Mindset. The research shows the benefits of an individual persevering through a problem with a positive mindset. It also states that it is important for the entire support structure to help reinforce these positive thoughts. We are not saying that just being positive will help someone achieve. We are saying that it is important to be positive as a student takes on a challenge. The student must also put in the work to achieve the goal, but we all know that it is easier to push yourself when those around you are supporting you. In other words, we want every

student to have the home field advantage as he or she works to succeed in high school.

I won't give up on you.

This last part is where we, as adults, need to practice what we preach. We have to have the determination and resiliency to keep working with our kids until they get it right. Whether we are watching them working on their Chromebook, helping learn how to drive in the snow, or being able to practice important life skills on their own, we need to be persistent, not give up, and never let our children, or students, quit.

Summer School

Summer School registration is currently in progress. Students can sign up for summer school by visiting their counselor. Whether your student is getting ahead or catching up, it is wise to register now in order to reserve a spot in the class. Classes will only be offered if there are enough students who enroll. Summer School will be offered at Sandburg High School this year, with the exception of a few courses to be held at Andrew. Prime Time for College-Bound Juniors

March is a great month to have your junior son or daughter make an appointment with his or her counselor to discuss college plans. Students interested in selective colleges are especially encouraged to make an appointment to begin preparing for the application process that will begin next August. Parents are always welcome to join students for this appointment in order to discuss the college selection and financial aid process.

It takes time and energy to find the right college match. Counselors recognize that this is a family decision. However, they can be helpful in sorting out their priorities and finding colleges that are the best fit for each child. Remember, when your child returns from summer vacation, he or she will be expected to have a short list of colleges ready for application. Most applications should be completed by the end of October of the student's senior year.

Juniors and Spring Break

Many families find that Spring Break provides the perfect opportunity for juniors to visit college campuses. Often, families who plan ahead can visit four to five schools in the same geographical area over two to three days. It is important to call schools in advance. In many cases (especially at private schools) the college

may offer free housing to students who want to stay overnight for a sample of dorm life. Because many schools are not on break at this time, a visit now is much better than during the summer when campuses are relatively vacant. If you need a list of questions to ask when you visit, please see your counselor.

Getting Into College - Some Helpful Tips

Whether your child is trying to get into Harvard or any other college, admissions committees will be asking five basic questions: How difficult was the curriculum chosen by the student?; How well did he or she do in that curriculum?; How did the student do on college entrance exams?; What activities outside the classroom did the student join?; What

was the quality of the involvement in those activities? While the questions are simple, the answers may be complex. Helping your child stay focused on these questions will ensure the greatest number of options after high school. If you have questions about college planning, please contact your child's counselor.

Passing Required Classes

As Summer School approaches, parents are reminded that students must pass both semesters of a required class in order to move on to the next level. For example, students who fail either

semester of Freshman English must repeat the failed semester before moving on to Sophomore English. Summer School is strongly encouraged for students in this position.

Children at Risk

Parents are reminded that they are always welcome to share their concerns regarding the welfare of children with the Guidance staff. Prevention is the important word on this topic. If you have a concern, please do not hesitate to contact your child's counselor. The Guidance staff is always willing to contact

teachers, speak to their students, or facilitate a meeting or referral to specific services when necessary. We work in partnership with parents and students to provide the best possible learning environment for the children and families that we serve.

DEANS' OFFICE: Every Minute Matters

Every 2nd semester, the Deans' Office looks at disciplinary referrals that occurred during the 1st semester. After examining this data, we look for ways to address identifiable trends. Two trends we are examining are chronic absences and tardies to 1st period and lunch periods.

Attendance Areas of Concern

The first area of concern, chronic absence, is defined by the federally mandated Every Student Succeed Act as a student missing 10% of total school days for ANY reason within one school year. District 230 has students in attendance for 177 days a year, so **if a student misses approximately 17 days of school for any reason, they are considered chronically absent.** Currently, we have identified approximately 160 students who are considered chronically absent according to ESSA.

The other area of concern, tardies to 1st period and lunch periods, was discovered by looking at referral data and the Skyward Student Information System. During the month of January, Andrew High School students had a total of 947 recorded tardies to periods 0-8. Of those 947 recorded tardies, 381 were to 1st periods; or in other words, **40% of all record tardies during the month of January were to 1st period.**

Lunch period tardies provided another large amount of total tardies for students. During the month of January, students were marked tardy during lunch periods 295 times, or in other words, **31% of all recorded tardies during the month of January, were to periods 4, 5, and 6.**

Combined, **periods 1 and periods 4-6 account for 71% of all the recorded tardies** at Andrew High School. Referral data indicated that attendance issues are the number 1 reason we see students on referrals in the Deans' Office.

Why is Attendance Important

The most basic answer is that research shows students who chronically miss school at an early age maintain those behaviors as they get older. The more school a student misses, the less likely he or she is to graduate from high school. On average, failure to graduate from high school will have a severe economic impact in the future for those students. As of January 2018 the United States Department of Labor found the following data:

*25 years old WITHOUT high school diploma - Median weekly income \$531

*25 years old WITH high school diploma - Median weekly income \$714

That is approximately \$732 per month difference or \$8,800 per year.

Aside from the potential economic impact, tardies and attendance issues result in visits to the Deans' Office and time away from class. Less tardies and less issues with attendance will directly result in more class time for students. More time in class will allow for a better chance to have success in the classroom.

Finally, the new federal mandate called ESSA (Every Student Succeed Act) factors in a school's chronic absentee rate when

rating the quality of schools in our state and country. Along with providing a rigorous and relevant education for our students, being a highly rated school where students are innovative, willing to grow in their education, and treat each other respectfully is equally important. All these factors promote student achievement and community pride.

How are We Going to Address Attendance Issues Moving Forward

The Andrew High School Deans' Office is going to design a series of ways to promote on-time behavior and continued high attendance rates. This promotion will hopefully increase on-time awareness by using social media to better communicate with the student body about why being on-time is important. Additionally, the Deans' Office is developing creative ways to promote these on-time behaviors at a building level as well. More specifics of the initiatives will be available in the near future.

A second step, is to constantly remind your student that every minute matters.

Nurse's Office Important Reminders from the Nurse's Office

Nurse's Office Alert: Attention Junior Parents/Guardians (class of 2019)

All students entering 12th grade in the State of Illinois are required to show proof of having received one dose of Meningococcal Conjugate vaccine given on or after their 16th birthday.

Proof of having received the Meningococcal vaccine is required and should be submitted to the School Nurse as soon as the vaccine is given.

Vaccine documentation can be:

- Dropped off in the Nurse's Office
- Mailed to Victor J. Andrew High School, Attention: Nurse's Office
- Scanned and e-mailed to the Nurse's Office at: vjanurse@d230.org
- Faxed to the Nurse at: 708-737-7725

It is important to note that your child will *not* receive a schedule, participate in athletics, or apply for a parking pass in the 2018-2019 school year until *documentation of having the vaccine is received in the Nurse's Office.*


